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



IMPACT (As per finding of Sattva)

More than 80% of the parents interviewed report that the girls have become confident & voice out

their opinions

More than 90% of parents and community stakeholders that attended the FGDs report a visible

improvement in the learning outcomes of the children

Community owned operational model is not in place as the program has been running for under two years only

A majority of beneficiaries reported that they **want to study at-least till grade 10** while At-least **8 out of every 10** beneficiaries want to **work after completing education**

- Livelihood is affected with changing times & technology
- Need for Education has aroused within the tribe to cope with the fast growing things all around.
- Disconnect from social welfare benefits

Rabari stands for **'The outsiders'** – They've earned this name due to their nature of not settling at one place and round the year migration





The main business of this community is to **raise cattle, camels and goats**

For pasturing their cattle, the people of this community instead of living in towns, keep **migrating in search of green land**.


This particular Rabari Tribe contains **100+ households with over 200**+ children in tow, migrates for 8 months of year

As a result, their children are **never enrolled** in formal education facility.

Rathshaala (Mobile School) travels with the tribe along the journey. Holding learning sessions twice each day – Early morning & Late evening.

Age group : 6 months to 16 yrs old.

Timing : 9 am - 6pm in the evening.

Learning is facilitated by experienced staff with due consideration to *Age Appropriate Education, Multi Grade, Multi Level & Multi Lingual*

Special care is taken to ensure children's cognitive & physical development by preparing & serving *freshly cooked Nutritious* & Hot Meals

Kandivali school for slum kids to stay open

After Mumbai Mirror's report on BMC refusing to pay school's primary teachers, help pours in from Thakur Village residents and IIFL Group



Kandivali East school for children from Sanjay Gandhi National Park slum is coming back to life after being on the brink of closure. After the BMC allegedly refused to pay salaries of primary teachers at Matrubhoomi Education Society (MES), local residents and the corporate social responsibility arm of a private firm have come to the school's rescue.

A private school where under-privileged children from Jahnupada Vaibhav Nagar slum have been studying for the past 24 years, MES's plight was reported by Mumbai Mirror on April 3. According to Akash Handikherkar, founder and director of MES, the BMC had issued a letter to the school in March, informing him about the decision to not pay the salaries of primary section teachers.

Help started pouring in from all quarters after Mirror's report. "While local residents agreed to pay for stationery of our students, the IIFL Foundation the CSR arm of IIFL Group, pumped in Rs 15 lakh and agreed to pay the school's primary teachers for the whole academic year," confirmed Handikherkar.

The primary section in MES has 180 students, with 25 in kindergarten, 350 in secondary section and 50 in junior college. When news of the school's closure spread, local NGO Inseed and Thakur Village residents started working towards generating funds for its survival. Inseed and its volunteers – mostly homemakers

Shirodi Kh is spread across **1157 acres** and has a population of 1540, with livestock numbering another 5470

The village receives reasonable rainfall, but most of the water runs-off as the natural path of the water has decayed due to negligence and extensive silting over the years.

IMPACT

Construction of a 2.9 km long trench has resulted in holding 25.52 cr litres and thus recharges 19 wells





Wahegaon is spread across **2203 acres** and has a population of **1550**, with livestock numbering another **5130**

50% of the 600 cr litres of rainfall is lost due to water run-off caused by the natural nalas getting clogged by silting.



Wahegaon is one of the worst impacted by water shortage

IMPACT

The construction of a 1.53km long Trench helps to recharge 17 wells and store approx. 33.4 cr litres of water




Health Interventions
